Challenges of First-Generation, Non-Traditional and Working-Class Students

This panel combines research on first-generation, non-traditional and working-class college students at UM-Dearborn with the experiences of community partners who directly engage with these students. The research focuses on two areas: the subjective experiences of first-generation Arab American students as well as food insecurity and the role of food pantries on college campuses. The community partners include the Public Allies Metro Detroit AmeriCorps program and the CASL Student Outreach and Academic Resources (SOAR) program; the latter uses a holistic model to retain admitted students by offering a wide range of academic, financial and personal support resources.
